

### RECTOR'S LETTER

There is something very British about the sound of church bells. For centuries, their ringing has called us to wake, to pray, to work, to arms, to feast, and, in times of crisis, to come together. They ring out joyfully at weddings and toll mournfully at funerals. They mark the significant events in the lives of individuals, communities, and nations

The early missionaries used small hand bells to call people to worship, with bells being introduced into Christian churches

around 400 AD. Since then, the technology and art of bell ringing has developed significantly, including the development of 'changes' that could be learned by heart to create patterns of ringing, and 'methods',

often titled after the cities in which they were first rung, such as Norwich, London and Cambridge.

At the end of the First World War, bells rang out across the country to celebrate the coming of peace, and have been used in celebrations ever since. 95% of bells in the UK 'rang in' the Millennium, a bell announced the opening of the London Olympics in 2012 and, as part of the Her Majesty the Queen's Diamond Jubilee celebrations a floating belfry with eight bells led the Thames Pageant of a thousand boats.

Located as they are at the top of church towers – often the tallest structure in a community – and their sound going out in all directions, the ringing of bells is a good picture of a key part of the Christian gospel – that of proclaiming the 'gospel' (good news) of Christianity and calling all people to respond. A group of people work together, using their skill and commitment, to do their part, which is then translated into a pitched 'song' that is broadcast to all people in the vicinity, whatever their age, sex or social status. The good news of Christianity is for all, and it 'rings out' when Christians work together to bring that good news to their local communities in word and action.

"The Lord's message rang out from you..." (1 Thessalonians 1:8a)

The ringing teams in both Harwell and Chilton are always open to new ringers, and learning bell ringing

can open up a hobby that can last a lifetime. A band of ringers can do so much more than one or two individuals – the variety of the 'changes' possible increases exponentially with each additional member. And so it is with proclaiming and being good news in our communities; with each new member, the possibilities multiply. We each have a unique and valuable role to play, ringing out across our communities.

### ALL SAINTS' WOMEN'S GROUP



Our next meeting is on **Tuesday 8th** May at 7:45pm at All Saints' Church. This is our planning meeting for the year so please come full of

A reminder that our outing in June is a week earlier than normal on Tuesday 5th June. It is an afternoon trip to Banbury to Infantilia, an amazing collection of antique nursery equipment.

### BELLS AND BELLRINGING

Bells have been rung in our churches for hundreds of years. The earliest bell in Chilton was cast in Wokingham in the 14th century, there were several additions and restorations

over the years. The bells were rehung in 1892 and a band formed which by 1894 had joined the local Branch of the Guild of bell ringers who taught them how to ring.

Often several members of the same family would join the band, including those of Silver, Woodley and Wetherall in Chilton. Several of these fought and died in the First World War. William Anthony Silver had married Eliza Jane Wetherall in 1914, he died in France in 1919,

he is remembered on his wife's gravestone, the nearest one on the left hand south side of All Saints' Church and on some of the church plate, together with his brother-in-law William Henry Wetherall killed in Belgium in 1917, who is remembered on the next gravestone, that of his father Ambrose. Archie Reginald Silver, younger brother of William, was killed in France in 1917; his name is recorded in the Roll of Honour Book for bellringers, created in 1924 to remember ringers who died during World War I.

Afterwards the ringing continued until World War II, when all ringing was stopped, unless there was an invasion when the bells were to be rung to tell the residents of the invasion. After the war, Bill Corduroy of Harwell came to Chilton to train a band of young ringers.

Unfortunately, the Chilton ringing had to stop in 1960 because the church architect had declared the tower to be unsafe. Fortunately the bells were restored to

Ringing is a social activity, each ringer pulls the rope for one bell. They ring one after the other to make a pleasant tune. All you have to do is pull the rope down straight, but this takes a little time to learn. Like riding a bicycle, the first time it seems to be impossible but

soon it becomes much easier, because the swinging bell does most of the work. Our Branch has a training Officer who arranges ringing sessions for beginners, where experienced ringers ring most of the bells so it is easy to notice when you are not ringing in the right place. On 11 November 2018 we plan to ring all the bells in the country before the church services in memory of those killed in World War I; please join us and start learning now so that you will be ready to ring easily with us then. Oxfordshire has an additional plan to ring all bells in the county at 7.05pm, in a 'Churches for Peace' project so that we can all live peacefully together in future.
